N.B. - At the beginning of the year HPC had Loans outstanding totalling £44,000. This balance was made up of HPC Members loans of £40,000 and the Archdeacon loan of £4,000.

- The final instalment of the Archdeacon loan was paid in October 2018 leaving loans outstanding of £40,000 as reflected in the accounts and noted below.

- The bungalow known as Lynton is still owned by Hailsham PCC and the rent received helps to fund the activities of HPC. The related costs and value of the remaining property asset are reflected in the accounts.

- Extraordinary Items are made up of: Receipts of £2,443 being a prior year adjustment for the Chancel Trust and Payments totalling £90,820 made up of the revaluation of the Investment fund. Trust Investment value at 31 December 2018 £880,084.

The Pledged Mission giving voted by the PCC in 2017 of £20,000 has been paid out. £10,750 in 2017 the balance £9, 250 in 2018 and is included in the above breakdown. We give thanks to have have been able to share God's wonderful blessing of Lynton.

Treasurer's Report - 2018

As always my thanks to everyone who has supported the Church with gifts both financially and with their time, of physical gifts during the year. This is very much appreciated, and we give thanks to God for our Church family.

Yet again this year there have been new challenges with the finances and accounts for HPC. Hence a busy but interestingly rewarding year again as treasurer. We should all give thanks to Roger again for his dilligence and hardwork and also to my finance team in sharing the responsibility of verifying the financial data required to enable the preparation of the accounts for their back up and on going support, advice & guidance during the normal day to day running of the activities at Hailsham Parish Church.

More importantly I give thanks to our Lord for his strength in all that he enables us to do at Hailsham Parsish Church.

General Overview

The main issues to this years finances has been :-

A} The commencement and in some instances the completion of various major works, from the funds raised from Estate of the late Ruth Deacon. The balance of the proceeds of the sale of the property has been invested. Works as follows :
 Roof repairs and replacement of all damages, to tiles beams guttering leading etc Office development, screening and wiring etc West End opening, stage one with Organ project and access to the Church building.

The Investment has been planned, to be held to generate income to help to maintain future staffing of HPC. It is also planned that the Capital element will be maintained as tangible fixed assets.

As previously reported the PCC, as custodians of the church property, under the Charities Act have a duty to maximise the return on any gifts to the church. To this end we are holding the asset of the Investment Fund plus the Bungalow "Lynton" and remaining land, while continuing to seek advice on potential future, further development.

The property as in prior years is fully reflected in the accounts and is continually being rented out, providing an income towards costs, which are being incurred in the maintance, insurance and management fees.

B} *Cash Flow:* Had it not been for the sale of the land we would not have been able to meet our obligations in maintaining the current level of Church Activities. Cashflow continues to be an issue affecting finances for HPC. As shown by the General unrestricted funds accounts (see pages 1 and 2) which had deficits both last year of £98,496 and current year a larger deficit of £117,342, due in part to roof repairs. Our regular and planned giving has increased by nearly £11,000 pa which is approximately £900 per mth this is lower than the increase in our monthly expenditure hence diminishing the general funds available to meet normal day to day running costs of our church. The shortfalls have been supported by reserves brought forward from previous years and investment funds held since the sale of the land. As mentioned above the remaining funds are designated for future projects and should not be used for General purposes.

The Parish Giving Scheme has continued to help the Cashflow in the prompt collecting of Gift Aid Tax relief. The scheme has been successfully taken up by a large portion of our members. **Should anyone, who is a tax payer, like to join the scheme please see Roger Booth or myself for a sign up form. Your help in joining this scheme would be very much appreciated.**

Without these gifts we could not have met our committed outgoings, we give thanks to God.

Unrestricted Income: (Page - Accounts 1)

As reported above regular collections & 'Committed giving' Income increased from £92,659:2017 to £104,070 in 2018. Regular Giving is below our budget target of £110,000 per annum (£9,170 per month), by £500 per mth.

This 'giving' has been boosted by a further $\pounds 21,019$ refund of Tax, from the Inland Revenue. The total amount received for Unrestricted Income was a total of $\pounds 255,732$ in the year. Restricted income received in the year totalled $\pounds 2,748$.

Unrestricted Expenses: (Page – Accounts 2)

The combined Parish Contribution (pays for cost of clergy, housing, church insurance etc.) was £88,162 in 2018. Our Total Expenses were £373,075, leaving a deficit of £117,342 for the year on the unrestricted figures.

Restricted fund income amounted to £2,748 so after deducting costs of £8,927 the deficit is £6,178.

Restricted funding: (Page – Accounts 3)

Page 3 to the accounts provides details of the Restricted fund movements in the year and an explanation of how we arrive at the restricted fund deficit mentioned above of $\pounds 6,178$.

Legacies

At the beginning of the year we were very grateful to receive a legacy from Margaret Frost's estate of £20,650 for the ongoing work at Hailsham Parish Church.

This very generous gift is a reminder of the many projects that have been completed over the years which have been largely dependent on members of the congregation thinking about the future and the ongoing work for Gods glory at Hailsham Parish Church after their death.

Some of the projects that have been completed as a result of Legacies include the lounge, along with the first kitchen and toilets, Emmanuel Hall (the church plant in the north of Hailsham). Then, with the help of John Hills' legacy the PCC had the opportunity to update the kitchen and toilets. The benefits of this have been immeasurable not only for the church members but also as we reach out to the wider Hailsham community. Then, of course, there was Ruth Deacon's legacy which has, among other things, enabled the PCC to reorder the Chancel including creating an enclosed office space, updating the sound system and replacing the pews with chairs giving the flexibility to use the entire church seven days a week not just one. The roof has been extensively repaired and the organ has been replaced giving the opportunity to open up the West End as the main entrance to the church building. However, of even greater significance it has enabled us to maintain staffing at the present levels for the future.

Legacies come in all forms and sizes but for Hailsham Parish Church they are vital to financially assist the ongoing work of spreading the Gospel of Jesus.

When you are next in church take time to look round the building and think what has and will be achieved by the legacies that many forward thinking members of the congregation have given. So, have you thought about making a provision in your will for the church and, if not, just think about the future benefits of doing so.

Deanery Synod Report

Deanery Synod meets three times per year, hosted by various churches in the group. In the last year we have received presentations on a variety of topics. For example, early in 2018 we heard from Mr Scott Ralph, Diocesan Property Director, on the work of his department in management of Diocesan houses etc., and a number of questions were asked from the floor. In December 2018 Revd Diane Watts, Together in Sussex Development Worker, spoke on her role providing advice and support for community outreach projects, and encouraging churches to share resources and expertise. This year we are also considering "Vocation and What It Means to Me," with an encouraging contribution by our own Rory Graham on his call to follow Christ. We also receive reports from our members of General and Diocesan Synod, as well as updates from parishes across the Deanery.

Music

The music team at Hailsham Parish Church aims:

a) with the church leaders, to select hymns and songs whose words, when we sing them, build us up in Christ, serving the purposes of church (such as teaching and reflecting on Biblical truth; encouraging one another in the faith; praying to and praising God); and
b) to make good use of the musical gifts with which Christ has blessed our church, using them for its edification and to God's glory.

The **hymns and songs** we sing are chosen by me and David Bourne, often with input from others, including staff and musicians. Over the past year fifteen new songs have been introduced.



The **team**, incorporating those involved in sound reinforcement, visual projection and action leading, currently consists of fifty-nine people, of whom forty-eight serve on a regular basis. Twenty-one people serve regularly as singers in the **choir**, seven as **lead singers** in a band and/or choir context, nineteen as **instrumentalists**, six as **audio technicians**, seven as **visual technicians** and four as **action leaders**. Roger Tipping, our organist, plays for 6.30 p.m. Sunday services (as well as many 10.30 a.m. services). Colin Dadswell co-ordinates the team of audio and visual technicians.

Whilst musical activity continues to centre on our **10.30 a.m. services**, the past year has seen the introduction of a small informal ensemble to our **6.30 p.m. services** roughly once a month. In addition to serving the regular Sunday congregations, musicians lead songs at *Pulse*, at **special services** at church and in the community (e.g. in local care home), at **meetings** such as the monthly evening *Meet and Pray* and at **events** such as the Easter and summer holiday clubs.

In 2018 **special music** was prepared for Easter Sunday, a choral evening service for Harvest Festival and Carols by Candlelight. In addition, a candlelit advent carol service presented a special opportunity to mark the arrival of our wonderful **new organ**, on which note many thanks are due to Ken Thomas for his very hard work on the organ replacement project. Exactly a year ago (at the time of writing) an evening of jazz in Chapter 12 began our *Connect 2018* mission week, which culminated in an amazing, unforgettable concert by the All Souls Orchestra.



Four whole-team events have taken place within the past year: a ten-pin bowling social on 29th June provided a chance to welcome some newer members; a prayer, review and planning meeting was held on 10th July; a meal out at The Cottage on 16th November was enjoyed by thirty-two; and a contingent from HPC attended at a training day, *Promoting a Culture of Congregational Singing*, run by Music Ministry at Christ Church Kensington on 2nd February.

Music Extra is back this academic year: five optional Wednesday evening meetings for adults in the music team to tap into. So far, a group Bible study, a new songs evening and a 'trickier songs' evening have averaged an attendance of twelve. A song-writing evening and a book discussion are on the horizon.

Junior Band, supported by Susie Graham and John Kimble, meets on Saturday afternoons about six times a year. Most recently five children aged 6-11 got together on 19th January to practise *The greatest in the kingdom are the servants* before launching it in the 10.30 service the next morning.

Youth Band, supported by Jazz Dixon and Sylvia Robinson, meets on Tuesday evenings during term time, usually fortnightly. Currently six young people (aged 11+) belong to the band. Most recently we enjoyed learning a freshly-written song by one of our founder members, Adam Tomalin: *Preserve us, God, for in you we take refuge* (Psalm 16). Keep your ears open for it! Those in Youth Band take it in turns to join our regular rota groups on selected Sunday mornings.

Phoenix Academy Music Club continues to run after school on Wednesdays with help from Rena Barrow, Margaret Booth and Jazz Dixon. At present about fourteen children aged 5 to 10 are attending regularly and enjoying learning the recorder. In December a new link was made with **White House Academy**, who invited us to sing carols at their **Christmas fair**. These activities help in strengthening links with two schools on our doorstep, where I also serve as a parent governor.

Thank you to everybody who has helped with church music in any way over the past year. **Please pray** for the music team, especially that we would have an increased desire to sing, play, lead actions and operate equipment for the encouragement of our brothers and sisters in Christ and for God's glory.

Reports from our Sunday Groups

Little Diggers

Little Diggers is our Sunday group for babies and pre-school children. The group gives little ones a safe place to play, enabling their parents / carers to participate in the main service without distraction. In addition, Little Diggers sessions include a short Bible story/teaching time plus a related activity. We usually have between two and seven children in the group.



At the moment our team is made up of three main leaders as well as eight others who help. We're thankful for those in Little Diggers and for the opportunity to introduce them to Bible truths at a young age. Please pray that they would grow up knowing and loving our Lord Jesus.

Seekers

The Seekers Group covers the 4 to 7 year olds, (children in Reception and Key Stage 1 at Primary School). Our weekly numbers average 4 with visitors joining us from time to time.

Discoverers

Discoverers is the Sunday group for Key Stage 2 children, (age 7-11 years). There are eight children on the register at present and we see, averagely, 6 each week. Tim Robson, Sylvia Robinson and Jazz Dixon led the group until Jazz stepped down in October. We miss her and would like to take this opportunity to thank her for her teaching and support of Discoverers. Since Christmas we have welcomed back David and Lyn Gooding and the fresh face of Susie Graham to the teaching team. The leaders are always very appreciative for the team of helpers and their contribution to the group, also, to Julie Bell for organising the rota and Lyn for organising the teaching.

Our aim is to make the bible accessible by engaging with the children through study and life application, with games, craft, drama, fun visual aids, discussions and video clips all based on the TNT Children's Ministries online teaching resource.



Over the past year we have looked at Israel's first kings Saul, David and Solomon. How they started well but all were tempted away from doing what God wanted of them and fell short of being the perfect Sovereign, but they pointed the way to the Promised King to come, King Jesus. Since Christmas we have looked at the **Parables of the Kingdom** series, based in Matthew; stories that Jesus told which have a deeper meaning often missed by many of his listeners. Presently we are back in the Old Testament with **Beginnings**, looking at Genesis, how everything began so perfectly and then went so horribly wrong. After this we will look afresh at the **King on the Cross** and what the Easter story means for us.

Over a year we cover quite a lot of biblical ground and would ask for your prayers over our teaching; that we find time to faithfully prepare and bring the truth of the Bible to the children, in a way that will engage them and lead them into a deeper understanding and to a personal faith. The children are often challenged by applying what they hear in church to their everyday lives, as most of us are, so please pray about this; that they get the support and encouragement they need to trust Jesus as their king and rescuer.

Youth Zone

Youth Zone has been running at HPC for many years and is a Saturday evening youth group for Year 6 (last year of primary school) upwards. In 2017 it changed from a monthly youth group to meeting weekly during term-time.

Up until summer 2018 the group continued to meet weekly with about 12 to 16 young people coming along. It was encouraging to see young people from church inviting along their friends and we often had 4 or 5 young people each week who had no other involvement with HPC. The group usually meets at Emmanuel Church but also goes out and about. We had games evenings in Abbots Wood, rounders on Longleys Farm, bowling at Freedom Leisure and walks in Park Wood. The summer session ended with a trip from Sovereign Harbour on "East Sussex 1" courtesy of the Maritime Volunteer Service, plus a barbecue on the beach at Holywell.



Due to changes in people's circumstances (moving, having a baby, etc) and the move of James our Curate we weren't able to continue Youth Zone in the autumn of 2018. This was a real loss for HPC as we have very few activities to offer those in the 11 - 14 age group. Following prayer and a number of discussions we have now managed to put together a smaller programme of monthly activities up until the summer of 2019. For the first time we are introducing a short gospel message or Christian discussion point as part of each evening. The group still needs help and you can do this in two main ways: First, consider whether you might be the right person to help on Saturday evenings to run Youth Zone (we are still short of leaders) and second, pray for Youth Zone. In particular pray that we will have sufficient leaders to run the group and that the young people from church who attend will have the confidence to invite their friends along who will then get to hear those short gospel messages.

Bellringing

Bell ringing continues regularly but with reduced numbers we have found it difficult to ring even six of our eight bells on Sunday mornings. Sunday evening quarter peals have continued for virtually every evening service with the help of other local ringers who are pleased to come and ring with us, but even this is getting more difficult. Over Christmas we managed to get enough ringers to ring for four of the six services, ringing between two of the Christingle services and only missing the 7.30 a.m. service on Christmas morning.

It is expected that the bells will be rung for Sunday morning and evening services to call people to worship as they have done for hundreds of years. At the morning service we get as many of our

ringers as possible to attend. For the evening service we get six or eight ringers and ring a "quarter peal" – this, in layman's terms, is ringing in a set pattern(s) (called a method) and lasts for about 40 minutes, non-stop. "Peals" are also rung at other times, to celebrate special events, and these last for around 3 hours non-stop.

We practice on Monday evenings here at St Mary's and are particularly lucky to have a few ringers from other towers who are willing to come regularly to make up our numbers and enable us to practice more advanced methods. Again this year we had an evening outing, ringing the bells at Laughton and having a meal together afterwards, which everyone very much enjoyed. The Ringing Centre at St Mary's is no longer operating.

During the last year bell ringing around the world has been remembering the ringers who gave their lives during the First World War – some 1,400 and their objective of recruiting this number of new ringers was far exceeded although we were not able to obtain any new ringers at Hailsham, we had been lucky enough to get two new ringers just before this time.

The Link Coffee Shop

This year at The Link we have remained busy. We still have a lot of regular customers, many of whom would otherwise be on their own all day. Also, several of our customers have long term health problems and dementia. We feel we are able to offer friendship, faith and a comfortable, safe place to be.

Staffing continues to be difficult. Although we appreciate Gordon and Charlie in charge of the kitchen for three days a week, we have lost one cook which leaves a gap. There are enough counter staff to give us cover, although this means several volunteers work more than one shift a week. Our



volunteers with learning disabilities continue to support us well and we are very appreciative of their help.

We enjoyed joining HPC for the Christingle Service and the pantomime this year and many of our vulnerable volunteers still attend Sampson Group at the Free Church where they have the chance to explore the Christian faith (and have tea!!)

At Christmas, we welcomed about 40 people for Home Alone lunch – a happy time.

Please continue to pray for customers and staff alike as we celebrate our 25th anniversary on 1st October this year.

Hailsham Foodbank

The past year has been very busy at the foodbank but we have had many blessings to help us along the way.

The main change was that due to losing our warehouse space we completely relocated our operation. Our distribution centre moved to our new office space in Market Square and our warehouse moved to our old distribution centre behind The Link. It's amazing that we had our own plans for the new office space but God had other plans which have, of course, worked out really well for us and the people that we serve.

Last year we had a 52% increase in foodbank use giving out 1486 three-day emergency food supplies and by the end of March (end of this foodbank year) that number will be up to more than 2000. As you can imagine, this creates a lot more work and we have recruited additional volunteers to help out. We were also extremely blessed that PJ Skips, a local company, came on board at the end of the summer and gives a significant donation to us each month that employs 2 part-time admin support staff – Tracey and Owen – which is a great help.



I was privileged to attend the first 2 day Mental Health First Aid Course, along with a member of the management team and one of the Crosslink trustees, funded by Different Minds last June. We have secured some funding which will enable volunteers to attend a 1 day course in the next few months which will give them a better understanding of mental health – something which affects many of our clients and indeed those in our community.

We have continued to have good support from local businesses, schools, churches and the wider community.

The Holiday Shack still runs during the longer school holidays providing activities and meals for families. This is where we struggle most to get enough volunteers so please look out for details of these sessions if you are happy to give up some time for us.

Relying purely on donations of food, we do often get imbalances of stock (along with every other foodbank in the country!). This has resulted in a couple of inventive ways of passing on baked beans during the year at Hailsham Street Market. If you can do just one thing to help us, it would be to check which items we are most in need of before you buy them. You can either pop in and ask or look on our website.

During this year Rory Graham became our trustee on the Crosslink Trust. This has been a real blessing and do feel free to ask Rory if you have any questions about the foodbank and how the churches link with it.

This is a very brief overview of the last year. If you are on social media do follow us on Facebook, Twitter and/or Instagram and you will see more of what we do on a week by week basis.

We would particularly value your prayers for the increase in people we are continuing to feed and for discernment in how we spend our time and money to best help those people. We are very much working to do God's will through the work of the foodbank and need the prayers of many to do this.

Caring and Sharing

As supporters of Caring & Sharing we are encouraged to make a small sacrifice from our comparative wealth so that poorer communities can enjoy life's basic needs.

The 4 projects supported by Hailsham folk reflect challenges facing Christians today e.g. poverty, disease, climate change, drug abuse and nuclear accidents. In Lima, Peru (illustrated) Shanty Towns Church Nurseries tackle the effects of poverty & climate change. The Little Flower Leprosy Village, India seeks to rebuild lives and bodies by rehabilitation and employment (but monsoon floods have not helped!). In Medellin, Columbia, street educators continue to rescue children from drug gangs. At the Pinsk Hospice, Belarus, nurses care for sick children 32 years after the Chernobyl nuclear explosion.



So, we must continue to support these Christian, humanitarian projects by our gifts and prayers as they build bridges for the gospel. Please contact me or Roger Booth for information and newsletters. Michael Partridge

Sangster and Asha

Paul writes in 2 Thessalonians *"We ought always to give thanks to God for you, brothers as it is right because your faith is growing abundantly and the love of everyone of you for one another is increasing. Therefore we ourselves boast about you (HPC) in the church of God in (Bangalore) for your steadfastness and faith"* This is so true of our partnership with HPC. We are thankful for your prayers, and calling us and encouraging us through e- mail, WhatsApp and the regular financial support.

The Local Community Church

The church which used to meet at our house went through a major transition. It was very hard for us to decide to stop the church plant and look out for a church closer to home and cafe. God guided us to join Bangalore Bible Church, and welcomed us. Now they are part of the cafe mission. When we are involved in the Kingdom work, there are ups and downs. God supports us through his Church all over the world. God continues to use our home as a light house to partner and help **Compassion** on Saturday's for their weekly kids programs to do their Children's outreach ministry and on Monday's, **Living Hope community church** gathers at our home for their Tamil outreach prayer fellowship. There is a constant threat all around but we have to tread cautiously in the Indian context. **Partnership with International Students.** We have been working with International students who come to our cafe and FBB (Friends Beyond border). Asha helped at their first camp with 58 students from 21 nations. It was nice to see God at work in Bangalore reaching out to students from Afghanistan, Middle East and

African nations. God is opening doors to reach closed nation. We are very excited about how God is using the cafe in this area. The whole experience took us back to our time with Careforce.

Stars Cafe

The cafe has been doing well for the last one year in the area of ministry. We have seen an increase no of students coming regularly. By God's grace a lovely team is coming together to help us Jaichand is a Novelist, formerly a pastor his wife Saritha is a School Teacher, Praveen owns a business and Miriam works for Adventure and Camping ministry. Yannick a student from bible college help at cafe regularly for the Bible study on Thursday, monthly time of prayer and follow up on discipleship. Benjamin and Dave the two pastors of our new church also come to help in doing Discipleship and Evangelism training. This was an answer to prayer and a joy to work with a team who have passion for youth ministry. We have 6 Christian students and 9 Non christian students come regularly. We have seen them growing in faith and openness to gospel. It was sad we lost one muslim girl who was part of Christianity Explored and Prodigal God series, she died of an Over Dose and this really shook us all and helped us to know the urgency in reaching out. And being very much watchful for many students who are lonely and addicted to various habits. Especially students from LGBTQ community. Suicide rate is very high in Bangalore.

Library and play home

Thomas a cafe student is partnering with Asha to open a library and playtime at our home. We have collected a lot of toys and books over past 8 years and thought it will be good to use the space above the house - Ruth and her friends and Timothy and his friends will enjoy this summer and we are very excited that the space above our home will continue to draw in kids from our neighbourhood.

D'Localites Podcast

I was able to start a new initiative online by voicing out news, views and interviews. Most of the work done is online. This way we are able to engage with people around the country and speak to them about key issues in life. Our highest rating online was on the movie 'Green Book' and on 'Life of a woman in India' Our aim is to engage with the Christian and the secular of the country and the world. We are a team of four people making unheard voices heard.



Goat Farm

This year we put in new planks and did minor repair works at farm. We began to use water from the school, that way fodder cultivation was better than last year. We desperately need a bore well to water the farm. This year it's been declared in the country as the worst drought seasons. We've had no rainfall for about 6 months or more. We have a long way to go but we are hoping this year things will change. Continue to pray that this farm will thrive well and will bring in the finance to sustain it and expand. We are hoping to extend the fodder and farm space.

Neerekshe Trust

I had to take more responsibility at the School in the village. One of our friends, Shibani, is helping with staff development, I visit the school twice a month and check the progress.

Family

We, as a couple, really struggle to love one another well. We are going through a season of discouragement and sense of failure of the church plant. We also are facing increasing responsibility to help our parents and in parenting two high energy kids. We saw our rebellion to God and the mercy of God. We need His mercy and Grace to teach us that without his help we can do nothing and we are still in the season of discouragement, The church is been so supportive and we meet the pastor and his wife and share our struggles and pray together.

We are grateful and thankful for all your support through these years. we look forward to your support in the coming years. Thank you so much once again, your partnership in the Lord is a great blessing in Bangalore.

We have just celebrated our first anniversary here in in Valencia, Spain and, although we have settled into life here, we are still often surprised at differences, usually related to food and eating!

Jemima continues to be home educated throughout the week and Theo attends the British School of Valencia which is located just over the road from our flat. His hours are 9am - 5pm which sometimes feels quite a long day for him although he does have a two-hour lunch break. He also has a private Spanish tutor twice a week after school. Our usual weekly routine consists of Monday and Wednesday morning Spanish lessons for Nicky while Julian helps Jemima with her learning at home. Julian has lessons on Tuesday and Thursday mornings although he will stop these in April.



Julian leads a small weekly bible study group, 'Grupo de Vida' at our house and this has proved to be a great time for not only sharing God's word together, but also getting to know some of the church family a little better. The group is made up of Spanish-speakers so Nicky is accessing the group little by little as her Spanish improves.

We run an English-speaking service at church on the first Sunday of every month in addition to the regular weekly Spanish service. Julian has gradually taken on more responsibility in the general ministry at church including preaching and leading regularly, while Nicky helps with children's work and music.

We are so thankful to God for many things this year and have seen His work in our family, helping us to settle into this new life and adjust to learning a new language (the latter mainly for Nicky and the children). He has sustained and encouraged us when we have been faced with illness, sadness, loneliness or lack of confidence. And He has provided for us when we have needed friends, medical care or messages of encouragement from friends and family, to name a few examples.

The ministry at church continues to develop and we are thankful to God for the on-going witness in Valencia of that church. There are a good few people who regularly attend and serve the church family lovingly.

We are slowly getting to know people outside of church life too, for example, at Theo's school, at language classes, at our local dog park where Jemima knows everyone (and every dog!) and in local shops and cafes around where we live. Julian met one man when he was walking the dog in the park near our house who contacted him for advice after finding out he is a minister. He and his wife ended up completing Christianity Explored with Julian and they now regularly attend the English service with their son.

We continue to thank God for the ministry opportunities He provides here at Uganda Martyrs Seminary, Namugongo (UMSN), a Bible college training men and women from across Uganda, Kenya, Sudan, South Sudan and Tanzania for gospel ministry. We've been at UMSN for 7.5 years now (time flies!) My (Chris') main work as 'Head of Theology' is in teaching and mentoring students, running Bible studies, and organising the smooth-running of the whole department so that our 85 or so current theology students would by God's grace receive the best, most biblical, faithful, Uganda-specific and Christ-honouring training possible.

Ros is involved in many different ways including, but not limited to, teaching some lectures to students, running a weekly Bible-study with female students, co-ordinating the college development such as supervising the building of 3 new dormitories, and acting as a health-adviser for all students, as well as home-schooling Josh (9), Danny (7) and Chloe (4).



As we look back over the past 12 months, we're very grateful for many things. Chloe has successfully begun home-schooling and integrated well into the 'class'. We've sent out over 40 students into gospel-ministry across Eastern Africa, some of them into extremely difficult contexts to serve boldly and faithfully. All college students have participated in over 20 Bible studies each which has sharpened and strengthened their Bible knowledge, spiritual maturity and leadership skills. We've run 2 preaching conferences for current students and 1 for former students, to sharpen their skills. As a college we've been able to run marriage conferences, invite many guest lecturers to come and speak, taught thousands of hours of lectures to our students, and taken them out for mission work on several occasions. However, any facts and figures like this will always fail to tell the full story. What's most important is that we've seen God, by His grace and through His word and for the glory of His son, transform students and call and commission and send them into tough settings to preach the gospel faithfully, call people to come follow Christ, and disciple them for lifelong Christian faith and service.

We'd be lying if we suggested there weren't disappointments, setbacks, and frustrations every step of the way, but God is faithful and he is using the seminary to spread His name throughout the nations of East Africa. We're so grateful to God, and thankful for HPC and your partnership with us as a family and us as a college in this work.

Looking ahead – we ask our gracious and kind God for...more of the same! We pray that the college will be able, amidst many challenges, to continue in this work. We pray that we'd be able to find the resources to complete the third (and probably final) dormitory we're building. We pray that we as a family, would remain healthy, well and sustained amidst the ongoing challenge of living with 'culture stress' (where you can never really feel fully at ease as you are in your own culture). We pray that our students would be fully captured by the immense privilege of serving the Lord Jesus even in such arduous circumstances. We're praying for more staff to come in and join us in this work, and we're praying for more students to be sent who we can train up. We're praying for all of us – college principal, ourselves, all staff and all students, to grow in godliness and faithfulness to trust God in His word.

So please do pray with us in these things. Please also receive our warmest greetings and our deepest admiration for your partnership with us in this work. We pray for you and ask God to bless you as you make Christ known throughout Hailsham, as we do here in Uganda.

It's a wonderful privilege to be part of God's unstoppable mission to get the monumental news of all that has been done for us, through Jesus, to the ends of the earth. You are part of this mission too and it's wonderful to know that we're both partners in the Gospel together to get this monumental news out to those around us.

So, without further ado, let me explain a little more about what I've been doing on my side - in Johannesburg. Every intern at Hope Church and most other staff members are given two key areas of ministry - a primary area and secondary area of focus. My primary area of ministry has been youth ministry which I've thoroughly enjoyed. Working in this area has presented many challenges as well but by God's grace, I really feel that I've grown in my ability to minister to the young people in our unique context and I've learnt a lot from the team around me. The youth work I'm involved in comprises helping to run our Friday evening youth sessions. With these sessions, I've had the opportunity to give a lot more talks which I've really enjoyed. I also meet with some of our youth on a one to one basis, to read the Bible with them. This year, I'm going to be focussing more on student ministry as my secondary area of responsibility. The student ministry has taken quite a heavy hit recently, for various reasons, so I've been asked if I could take over a Bible study in a nearby flat for private student accommodation. So far, these studies have been going well and it's been really good to get to know students better.

On top of involvement in these two areas of ministry, I'm also receiving training through two main programmes. I attend a local Bible college for two mornings a week, which is the highlight of my week at the moment. I've loved the teaching (which is given at Johannesburg Bible College) and feel immensely privileged that I've got another year to spend studying there. Also, once a week, the interns at Hope church gather together to receive some more formal 'in house' training. In these sessions we practice giving talks, we go through a Bible passage in a lot of depth and focus on talking about our various experiences in ministry.

It's also been a joy to engage with various different cultures that I'm surrounded with. In many ways, Jo'burg is a melting pot of cultures and having the privilege to minister in this context has been of great encouragement to me.



To wrap things up, going forward, I'd really appreciate your prayer that God would sustain and grow the youth work and student ministry that I'm involved in. Please pray, in particular, that I would grow in greater dependence on God, as the one who grows the Kingdom, not me. Please also pray for me as I'm about to make some big decisions for the future – pray that they would be wise and God honouring decisions for the sake of his Kingdom.

Overview – Looking Back - Looking Forward

LOOKING BACK

It's remarkable how time flies! It only seems a moment ago that our mission week, 'Connect 2018', was coming to its fantastic musical climax and now another year has passed. We've made progress in some areas, consolidated in others and yet there has been sadness and disappointment too, it's normal church life!

As you know we sum up our life together with the strap line – 'knowing Jesus, making Jesus known'. That's our aim, that's what we do, the task the Lord has entrusted to us at the heart of Hailsham.

Knowing Jesus is, of course, more like a journey through life in the company of the King as He leads us home. That's the picture given us in the book of Exodus, a pilgrim people listening to the word the Lord and learning to trust Him amid all the challenges of the journey. And it's important to understand that we take this journey as a people, a family. So, we meet week by week, in meetings large and small, we open the Scriptures, hungry for God to speak, we pray with expectation trusting God is at work and we support, encourage and strengthen one another – it's called church! And with our new entrance it will be important to expand our 'open church' to include lunchtimes for far more of the year – can you volunteer to join that team? Jesus came ultimately to die on the cross (*John 12:24 - 27*) for us and for our salvation. (*1 Timothy 1:15*)

..... Grace Dependent

We depend on the grace of God through the Holy Spirit to open our eyes, lead us to Christ, to supply our spiritual need and to lead us home. *(Romans 8)*

We are an EVANGELICAL church

..... We believe the Bible, we preach the Bible

The Bible is God's Word to us, all Scripture is God speaking (2 Timothy 3 :14 - 17, Psalm 119:42,142, 2 Peter 1:18 – 20)

It is **sure** – reliable, true and our supreme authority (2 Peter 1, 2 Timothy 3)

enough – sufficient, we do not need any new revelation, we neither add to nor subtract from the Bible. (Hebrews 1:1 - 4, 2 Timothy 3)

clear – understandable. (Deuteronomy 30:11 – 14)

necessary – we need his wisdom not ours. (2 Corinthians 2:6 – 13)

final - just as Jesus is God's final word, so is the Bible. (Revelation 22;18_

and it's all about **JESUS**. (John 5:39, Luke 24:44)

We are an ANGLICAN church. That means we are

..... a confessional (and historic) Church

The Church of England through its 39 Articles and Book of Common Prayer proclaims the great truths of the reformation. In particular – the final and supreme authority of the Bible (Article VI, XX, XXI) and that we are justified (reckoned right with God) by the grace of God alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone (Articles X, XI, XVIII, XXXI) and all to the glory of God alone.

..... a liturgical church

In returning the Church to the Bible, the Reformers saw liturgy as a key tool in that task. So, Anglican liturgy includes extensive use of Scripture, including the reading and preaching of

Scripture and a content and structure aiming to teach Bible truth, especially justification by faith alone.

..... a connectional church

As an Anglican church we are a connectional church, linked to a wider Diocese and to Anglican churches throughout the world. In particular, we are linked through GAFCON and the Jerusalem Declaration (gafconuk.org) to orthodox Anglican churches throughout the world and through the Church Society (churchsociety.org)_to orthodox Anglican churches in the UK and to other local gospel centred churches locally through the Sussex Gospel Partnership (sussexgospelpartnership.org.uk)

..... a parish church

As an Anglican church we have a responsibility to a specific geographical area/parish in our case Hailsham. As a parish church that also gives us unique opportunities for mission in the wider community, in our schools and in civic life.

So, as we go forward we will need to make sure we have the finances in place through the PCC and the new Hailsham Parish Mission Trust, with its focus on employing gospel workers; that we are equipped to serve each other with generosity and love; that we learn to make the most of a re-ordered building with open doors; that we are ready to meet Hailsham's growing population with a warm welcome and the good news of Jesus, that we learn more deeply to call on the Lord in prayer without whose grace we can do nothing and that amid all the change we remain unchanging in preaching and living the word of God for our generation and for generations to come, to the glory of God alone!
