TEAR FILLED QUESTIONS -LIFE GIVING ANSWERS -WELCOME TO EASTER

I'm sure that at some point you will have been to a funeral. You will have stood at the graveside and watched as the coffin was lowered or the curtains drawn at the crematorium. It is the sad scene repeated countless times every day. It might have been you standing at the grave of a loved one feeling numb and raw, a rollercoaster of emotions and memories even disbelief, is this really happening, perhaps anger and probably guilt. Never far away the fundamental question, 'what happens when we die, is that it, is this all we're destined for, to return to the dust from which we came?' Such is our experience when someone we love has died and at some point, that will be the experience of all of us.

Yet I'm certain that none of us will ever have experienced what Mary Magdalene experienced. Going back to a grave, finding it open and the body that had been there, that you'd seen buried, gone! Yes, incredibly that's what happened to Mary, but not just Mary. She may

have been first on the scene, but others too came and saw. Two days earlier they had seen him die, nailed to a cross, hung up for all to see, dead and buried on a Friday afternoon. But now on a Sunday morning that same tomb was empty, the body was gone, and a voice calls out, 'Mary', she turns and there He is, the one who was dead alive again!

Back in 2015 the then Prime Minister (that seems so long ago in politics!) gave an interview. He was asked about Easter. 'Easter, he said, was all about remembering the importance of change and responsibility and doing the right thing for children. Well, with all due respect to a previous Prime Minister, that's rather wide of the mark! In fact, wrong on all counts. David Cameron wants to talk about values, Easter tells us something altogether more radical, more exciting and utterly transforming. It announces the victory of the King, proclaims his triumph over death, his sin-crushing death on the cross. It welcomes the all-conquering hero.

When it comes to the question, 'what happens when we die', surely, we need to hear from an expert. Yes, I know it's popular to rubbish the opinion of experts, after all there are just so many of them, but in this case there's only one. Someone who was very, very dead and not just for a few brief moments in the operating theatre but stone cold dead and buried and was alive again. The only expert on life and death and the future, who's been



there, done it and come to tell us. And come to announce, 'no – death doesn't have the last word', but here is an invitation to live. An offer of pardon and peace in the midst of our broken lives, of forgiveness for rebels, of pardon for failures, a home for the homeless, and that's just for starters! An invitation to come home, to taste God's love and friendship and LIFE that lasts forever. It's a game-changer isn't it? It's not about values. It's an invitation to live.

In 1829 George Wilson was condemned to death in the USA for armed robbery. His partner in crime was executed but because of powerful connections Wilson was pardoned by President Andrew Jackson, the sentence reduced to 20 years in jail. However, Wilson refused to accept the pardon. It began a lengthy legal case, can someone be forced to accept a pardon and live? The answer, no. 'A pardon which is an act of grace carries no force unless it is accepted by the individual to whom it is offered'.

Wilson continued to refuse life and in 1833 was executed. Would you refuse a pardon and the offer of life?

Easter is the victory of King Jesus and remarkably he longs to share that victory with you and me even though we don't in the least deserve it. So, there it is the Easter invitation, pardon, life and victory over death; a gift for you and me from the King! It certainly beats chocolate. But as with all invitations it comes with an RSVP.



Will you come and investigate this expert's credentials? Please reply to the King and come and enjoy – forever!

BUILDING UPDATE

We are almost there! Work to complete the re-ordering of the

building will begin on Monday 8 April.

It will involve opening up the west end at the base of the tower to create the new main entrance for building with the great advantage of



wheelchair friendly, level access.

This will create a large lobby/welcome area with glass screens/doors into the nave (the main meeting area). Above will be an open meeting room leading on to a small gallery which at a later date could be further extended if more seating capacity was needed. There will be repairs to the west wall crack, new storage facilities and additional seating in the south aisle increasing the overall capacity by approximately 30 seats. In addition there will eventually also be a new alignment of footpaths to the west door. The main contractors are Parker and Son of Battle though with a number of specialist subcontractors also involved.

The works are expected to be completed by the end of October. Please note that for safety reasons the main church building will closed to all users (with the exception of direct access from the lounge to the office) weekdays from Monday 8 - Monday 15 April. This is to allow for the erection of scaffolding and boarding to enclose the west end and will result in the temporary loss of two rows of seats at the back. Please note also that with the exception of Easter Sunday there will be no access for bell-ringing during the works.

And looking ahead there will be a an 'open house' mission week next March showcasing the completed works and with an official opening/service of thanksgiving on Sunday 15 March 2020 with Richard Jackson, Bishop of Lewes.

MUSIC MINISTRY TRAINING COURSE

Promoting a Culture of Congregational Singing: Music Ministry London Conference, Saturday 2nd February 2019

On a crisp day at the beginning of February, four members of our music team (Katie, Sharon, Elizabeth and myself) made an early start from Polegate station to get to Christ Church, Kensington for 9:45.

The demand for this year's conference put on by the organisation Music Ministry exceeded the capacity of the building, meaning that around a hundred people who wanted to come had to be turned away! We were glad we got hold of our tickets when we did!

The conference opened with Nigel Styles, the director of *The Cornhill Training Course*, a Bible teaching course, reading and speaking on Exodus 15: 1-21, Israel's song about God's victorious work. Among other things, we saw that the gospel sustains the pilgrim: their past rescue gives God's people confidence that God will get them home. The main conference speaker was Matt Merker, a pastor and musician, who had travelled across from Washington DC, where he lives and works on the staff Capitol Hill Baptist Church. Here at HPC we have recently begun to sing a couple of songs that Matt has had a part in writing: *He Will Hold Me Fast* and *Whate'er my God Ordains is Right*. Matt spoke engagingly on the topic *Promoting a culture of congregational singing*.

Among other things, we saw from 1 Corinthians 12-14 that a local church is the body of Christ and that, as a result, everything that happens in a local church -- singing included -- should be done for building up. One analogy Matt used particularly struck me: he explained that we are simultaneously patients and doctors in God's hospital, ministering and being ministered to as, together we speak and sing the truth in love towards one another.

Opportunities for more practical aspects of training came either side of lunch. A new songs session sent us away with one or two ideas. In fact, a song we've recently introduced, All I Have is Christ, is one we picked up at the conference and subsequently tried at our own musicians' new songs evening a few days later! Seminars for musicians and music leaders included helpful tips as well as providing insights into how others approach music ministry in their own settings. As you might expect, we had plenty of opportunity to sing together too.

In reflecting on the day, Katie wrote: 'It was enriching to spend time with fellow musicians to be built up in our music making at church. Singing the songs, both old and new, was very uplifting.'

It's fair to say that we didn't agree with everything we heard, especially during the Question and Answer session, but then critical engagement is a healthy and stimulating thing!

WHATE'ER MY GOD ORDAINS IS RIGHT

This hymn text was written as long ago as 1675 by the German hymn-writer Samuel Rodigast, possibly to console a sick friend, Severus Gastorius, who may have been the composer of the original melody. Matt Merker and Keith Getty, in 2018, set the centuries-old text to a beautiful new melody. We recently introduced this 'new old' hymn in conjunction with our evening service sermon series on the book of Job, an innocent believer who knew immense suffering. As the Bible teacher Denny Burk puts it, '[Whate'er my God ordains is right] is written as a song for saints who are suffering. Which means it is written for all of us.' It is all very odd; this man is going to his death without a word. The talk is that he is God. Not a god, mind you, but GOD. Could anyone really do this to him if he were? Only if he allowed it I suppose. I believe it though and I need to know more, so I am going to join his followers. There seem to be quite a lot of us now.



OLIVET TO CALVARY.

This year on Good Friday evening (19th April), HPC will be welcoming our friends from Hailsham Choral Society who, joined by a handful of members from our church choir, will be singing **Maunder's Olivet to Calvary.**

John Henry Maunder (1858 - 1920) was organist and choirmaster at a number of churches in South London. First published in 1904, Olivet to Calvary, as the preface to the first edition puts it, 'recalls simply and



reverently the scenes which mark the last few days of the Saviour's life on earth... The rejoicing of the multitude with hosannas and palms, the view of Jerusalem from the steep of Olivet, the lament over the beautiful city...the lonely walk back over the Mount at night...the Supper of the Passover...the infinite pathos of the Garden of Gethsemane, the sudden appearance of the hostile crowd, Jesus forsaken by his disciples, his utter loneliness among ruthless foes, the tumult before Pilate...the passage of the cross, the tragedy and triumph of Calvary.'

The work also includes three hymns for the congregation to participate in. The performance, which promises to be a special occasion, will be free of charge with an opportunity to make a donation as part of a retiring collection.

100 YEARS AGO

From the Hailsham Parish Magazines of April/May 1919 April 1919

The Church of England Central Fund is going on well and May 25th is the day for every Parish in England to contribute to it. Papers on the subject will come in the May Magazine it is not only the money but the corporate interest which is wanted and which will be stimulated.

We want some of our young Churchmen to learn to ring the bells and call the people to Church; and we want some more amongst the Choir men.

I like the idea of a Public Library as a memorial for the fallen brave men of Hailsham and should like to see the column of granite (grey, I hope,) with the names engraved, placed exactly opposite the house which Messrs. R and Arthur Green have so kindly offered, in the Pleasure Ground. It would interfere with nothing and be very central. And why not collect an Endowment Fund for the Library!!

Also the Festivities on the Proclamation of Peace are thoroughly English and impress the young immensely. They are to begin with a public recognition of God, and in Church we shall begin with the Holy Eucharist (thanksgiving service) at 7am probably. I hope everyone will give liberally to the Fund. I believe Mr J R Green is the Hon. Secretary.

To the casual observer the world seems upside down! To the Christian there is a force under and through it all arranging according to plan – and that plan is an Eternal one coming into sight at intervals. We are in such now and we may look to a glorious outcome amid the shaking or after it. It is called the "Kingdom of God" coming, or the "Restitution of all things" which prophets have announced and all creation yearns for.

May 1919

My dear Friends

Peace Easter was a happy, joyous day and at the Eucharist there seemed an atmosphere of thanksgiving and dedication. We all remembered the past. We felt the gladness of the present and we offered ourselves for all such good works as God has prepared for us to walk in.

The Memorial Service at Chichester, April 23rd, St George's Day, was one to be remembered. It is beautifully described in the County Herald of last week.

Perhaps the most touching scene was when our venerable Bishop, soon to lay down his office, received the record of all the names of those who had fallen in the War from the several Parishes of his Diocese, and solemnly presented them on the Holy Table with prayer. Our names were there. Were they looking down on that scene? Then Gounod's beautiful anthem, "Come unto me" was sung, and then, so softly, so sweetly, "Abide with Me".

The Magazine is now £20 in debt. The losses during the War! How shall we meet it? A Jumble, or increased advertisements, or each person who requests a little notice in the Magazine sending 1/- with the request, or more? I take for granted you don't want me to pay for it.

The Easter decorations were worthy of a Peace Easter. The Services were well attended. The Vicar's Offertory amounted to £22.1s. 6d. which forms the nucleus of a Memorial Window Fund, either without names, if they are inscribed on the proposed Memorial Column, or with names if that is not done.

The day for Peace Celebrations will be, I hope, a thoroughly characteristic one which all our young children may never forget. I well remember a poor old applicant for Old Age Pension some years ago nearly losing it, though long past 70, because he could produce no evidence of any kind as to his birth, till by a happy thought, somebody set his memory going and he eloquently and almost enthusiastically told us how his parents took him to Battle to the rejoicings at Queen Victoria's enthronement. He remembered those Teas and Shows and fun, 1837.

We have kept it in for five long years, let us have some way of expressing ourselves. Let us have a good old English day, and if the Parish Meeting decides to adopt the Public Libraries Act, and the public will ear-mark their donations for Wellington House we shall get an endowment for future expenses and a good, suitable memorial.


