

# SO WHERE'S YOUR VOTE THIS CHRISTMAS?

I'm sure you remember it well, 6 December 1923 and the last time we had a

December election. And, of course, as you probably know that resulted in a hung parliament! Now I've no idea what you think about the merits or otherwise of an election in December and even closer to Christmas. It might even snow and then where would we be! But whether you're for or against an election, whether you're in or out, hard deal or no deal, do it again deal or let's not bother after all, elections are supposed to be about more than one issue. They're about electing a parliament and from that




parliament a government with the great hope that that government will provide good government. Surely, in the end that's what we all want; whatever the specific policies we want government that provides justice and security for all, that really does care for the most vulnerable, that is consistent, clear, honest – it means what it says and endeavours to keep its promises – good government. However, on past record of governments of every colour it would be wise not to expect too much! Too often governments are divided, inconsistent, muddled, compromised, they fail to deliver on what they promise and perhaps, what we often forget, and they rarely admit, the problems and challenges they face are often very complex and difficult. Dare we say too big for any government!

And that brings us to Christmas, the coming Jesus. Christmas/Jesus comes with all manner of promises. Promises of joy, of hope, of peace, of forgiveness and of life and interestingly promises of good government!

Here's how Christmas was announced to Mary and among many promises it's a promise of good government!

Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call his name Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give to him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever, his kingdom will never end. (Luke 1:30-33)

First, it's the promise of a King. The clue's there, this baby will be a descendant of king David. This is a royal birth. That in turn takes us back centuries before to hear the promises that were made about this descendant of David; that one day there will be a perfect king, true and right and just – a ruler who will not disappoint.



Then, the baby is described as the Son of the Most High, Son of God and you get a hint of the unbreakable love between the Father and the Son, a deep, intimate and eternal relationship of love. Don't we long for rulers who understand us, who care, who are full of compassion and love. Rulers who aren't interested in the next photo opportunity at the

hospital, who aren't obsessed with their own image and popularity but rather who are there to serve. Dare we say a ruler ready to give his life for his people, now that's different. And then this Ruler is given great power. The Most High is another way of saying the mighty, all powerful God. This King will reign with all the power of the mighty God. We often worry, don't we, at the thought of rulers having too much power. We're afraid we can't trust them, after all absolute power corrupts, but not with this King. He will reign with justice, with righteousness, with love. And he will reign for ever, his kingdom will never end! No need to worry that he'll be over-thrown or he'll die or abuse his power. In a way it's very simple, the promise of a perfect King whose reign of love and peace and justice will never end!

Given what seems to be the mood of our nation, whether we're in or out, there's a frustration and sadness about our politics, but then again when it comes to the election the only people we can vote for are people just like us with a built in ability to mess up! How wonderful then to hear the Christmas announcement of Jesus, the true and perfect King, to rejoice in his coming and the foretaste he gives us and to look forward to his return when his rule will finally be established in all the earth. And it'll be even better than Christmas!

Why not make this Christmas the time to meet the King and get ready to welcome his return, you won't be disappointed! Not in this Ruler!


We enjoyed looking at trains, cars, lorries and wonderful model scenes of villages tunnels and industrial areas with trains going around the track at the push of a button. Also a Scalextric track with cars that could be driven by visitors, (although Bridge Racing's set up is just as exciting

The museum section of the Hornby visitor centre was interesting, giving detailed history of toy makers such as Tri-ang, Hornby, Airfix and Meccano and others and how over the years, they survived and amalgamated into who they are today, and they are still thriving after so many decades. We also saw how new models were developed through research stages, measuring real vehicles and scaling down to various sizes, and passing this knowledge onto designers

and manufacturers who with great skill developed molds to perfect the model kits and toys that we have known and loved through our lives. They even had a section on the latest model developments using CAD software linked to 3D printers.

We then moved on to part two of our trip, to the Spitfire and Hurricane Museum at Manston. First stop the café where we had some very welcome lunch, fuel for the rest of our visit, we enjoyed each others company and chatted about all sorts, before moving along to the museum, with a pair of great fighter planes of WW2, the Hurricane and Spitfire. They had both of these planes on display, with lots of

memorabilia from the war period, with samples of old downed aircraft both German and British, and lots of stories of heroism and tragedy. The planes looked big in an enclosed space and it was good to see these wonderful aeroplanes close-up. I even learned that the big vent underneath the Hurricane, (and probably the Spitfire) was to keep the oil in the engine cool during operational flight.

They did have a flight simulator, but time was against us, and we had to hop along to the next part of the museum across the carpark. This had a

German flying bomb replica outside the entrance to the museum. We ventured in and saw many different aircraft that were operational during the modern era, including a Lightning Jet fighter and the Jaguar jet fighter too. They also had cut-away views of cockpits and interiors of planes and helicopters, and a vehicle that had been used in Downton Abbey ( I don't remember seeing that in the show...)

There were many excellent models of planes, transport of all sorts and people, and also many weapons of war, (which made you wonder what damage each weapon may have done, a very sobering thought).

We took many photos, and at 4pm it was time to leave for the homeward journey, we could have spent much more time there, like so many museums, there is so much information, that does not get read!





# Helen Thorne (Training Director: London City Mission) was speaking on When Times are Dark – Living with Depression and Anxiety



# 100 YEARS AGO

# From the Hailsham Parish Magazines of December 1919/January 1920

#### December 1919

Dear Friends

All the Missionary Societies are asking for more help or they must cease. This seems at first, deplorable, but may it not mean, leaving Native Christians more to their own resources; may it not be reverting to Apostolic methods i.e. St Paul's churches. We may be quite sure nothing but necessity will do it, as long as human nature has any prop to stand on it will not try to stand on its own feet – and it is really not much good till it does. This does not relieve us from effort in the least.

Advent is here. Never did the Season speak so solemnly to us. Advent is an Apocalypse, an unfolding – opening to vision what was hidden. The most extraordinary filling up of prophesy today is the Jews' Christians watch it with bated breath "The kingdom of God is come high you." The effect upon the Gentiles at whose hands they have suffered so long and so terribly, and upon their own future must be tremendous. May we, our Nation have a part In it. Prophecy bids us look for the final development of the Jews as something like Life from the dead to a worn-out world. The finale will not be till they say "Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord"

Hailsham has taken a decided interest in the Jews for over 60 years and it is increasing, judging by the large meetings on the subject and increased help, and, perhaps, surer still, by opposition and sneers. I hope you will come to the Meeting, December 3<sup>rd</sup>, at 7 o'clock, on Mesopotamia. With regard to this country generally, I think things are going on pretty well considering!

Armistice Day, Tuesday November 11th was celebrated in the City in a splendid way. All thanks are due to the Lord Mayor who seemed to have touched the hearts and brought out such a response. He had a Band playing in the balcony of the Mansion House (Salvation Army Band) and when it started "Jesu, Lover of my Soul," that beautiful hymn to Jesus, the whole crowd took it up; it rang amongst the masses, right up Cheapside, and men and women found themselves singing it in Cornhill and Threadneedle Street. It curled round Queen Victoria Street, and reached Princes Street, and when "Nearer my God to Thee" was started it fairly rose like a grand Te Deum upwards, followed by "Our God our help.. A simple prayer by the Captain of the Salvation Army was offered and so ended an Outdoor Service such as seldom has been seen. The Cathedrals ad Churches were filled, and beautiful music was heard as you passed

their doors. Truly November 11<sup>th</sup> in the City was worthily kept. Here we had well-attended Services at 11 and 7. There was a solemnity about the whole observance which speaks well.

#### January 1920

We are all asking, one year since the Armistice, six months since Peace was signed, and the final seal not yet fixed, when shall we be normal? When are the Comrades going to use their Hon. Chaplain? For I hear they appointed me to that post. I suggest they should come once a month January, February and March. March round the town with their band and bring the men in for half an hour.

We hope to do something towards the Church Memorial Window in the spring. It will probably be the South window, exactly opposite Faith, Hope and Charity. We have about £150 and more promised. We want £400. I thank heartily the Magazine Distributors. We began years ago with 600 and Jan. 1st send out 800. We have not dropped much during the War. I have another £1 given to the Deficit and hope 1920 to reduce it to under £12. This is far better than all the parishes around.

The Comrades are in full view! The Women's' Section is arranging a Salf Work for the Hut, and another Whist Drive January 15<sup>th</sup>. The Secretary asks for gifts. Members' subscriptions are wanted to close the accounts the Generall Meeting (Women) is fixed for Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> January at 3pm. They hope to give a Tea and Social to widows and orphans of the gallant heroes early in January.

The Hon. Librarian asks for Standard Works and Books of Reference, and books for Boys and Girls for the Parish Free Library he will arrange for collection.

The Parish Free Library and Institute was opened,, judging by the crowd, with great success. I hope it will be used by all the Parish as the Recreation Ground is. The Speeches were happy and they opened it with Prayer, which to me means a great deal as to its future.

Sackville, or Klondyke, or by whatever name it goes, is really a disgrace and a danger to the Town. How can the School Teachers hope for elevation when their boys and girls return through the slush and dismal surroundings to their homes. Is there no way but by Public Opinion? Then let us begin our Propaganda to get someone, or someones to do something somewhere. Roads are wanted and paths. Even the fish were complaining to a Parish Councillor in George Street last week, opposite the Church Tower, that it was too wet for them, and I joined in, but it was no good.


