

CONSCIENCE

When Marin Luther rode into the town of Worms in 1521, he was not a confident man.

Luther had long protested against the corruption of the Roman Catholic Church—most famously in 1517 with the posting of his *Ninety-five Theses* on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. After years of ensuing controversy, Pope Leo X finally excommunicated the German reformer in January 1521. In April of that year, Luther was summoned to appear before the Imperial Diet (Assembly) at Worms to defend his



controversial beliefs before the Holy Roman Emperor Charles V.

We may think of Luther as big and brash and full of swagger, but he came into Worms so intimidated that on the first day of his defence his statements could barely be understood. The Catholic authorities were threatening to banish him from Charles's empire—a vast territory centred in Germany and spanning central Europe. Luther's livelihood as a professor, and his very life, were at stake.

Luther knew what the authorities wanted him to do: recant his words criticizing the Catholic Church for its teaching and practices. However fearful he may have been at the outset, by the end of the interrogation Luther had gathered his strength.

"My conscience is captive to the Word of God," Luther declared. "Thus I cannot and will not repent, for going against my conscience is neither safe nor salutary. I can do no other. Here I stand. God help me. Amen."

On May 26, 1521, the Emperor rendered his decision. Luther was to be placed under a "ban and double ban." This Edict of Worms implored the men and women of the empire:

 ... not to take the aforementioned Martin Luther into your houses, not to receive him at court, to give him neither food nor drink, not to hide him, to afford him no help, following, support, or encouragement, either clandestinely or publicly, through words or work. Where you can get him, seize him and empower him, you should capture him and send him to us under tight security.

Luther was now a man on the run. The powers that be were adamant that Luther and his writings—and anyone sympathetic to his ideas—must be silenced. And yet, Luther was willing to endure all this—expulsion, danger, maybe even death—for the sake of his conscience. In a very real sense, you could say that the history of the Reformation, the history of Europe, and the history of the entire world was, in God's providence, altered because one man refused to violate his conscience.

Praise God Luther took his conscience seriously.

I wonder if you and I are quite so careful with ours.

One of the joys of being immersed in a different culture for a week is that it causes you to wonder about why as a Christian you hold the views that you do.

Our Uganda brothers and sisters in Christ are quite clear that Christians should not drink alcohol; whereas I think in moderation a Christian may drink alcohol if they wish.

In Uganda, women who follow Christ would only ever where skirts, whereas I think there is nothing in the bible that prohibits them from wearing trousers.



This isn't necessarily a question of right and wrong but one of conscience. I was interested to think how I had arrived at my views and why.

Many of you will know the story of Pinocchio. I remember the story as I learned it from the Disney cartoon version. The woodcarver Gepetto wants his puppet Pinocchio to be a real boy. Once this wish is granted, Jiminy Cricket

is assigned to be Pinocchio's conscience.

Pinocchio doesn't stay a little boy for long. He falls in with the wrong crowd, and his lack of truth-telling gets him into trouble. His nose grows long as a sign that lies eventually become as plain as the nose on your face.

As he continues to lie and ignore Jiminy Cricket, Pinocchio starts turning into a donkey. He blurts out a "hee-haw" in the middle of sentences. He starts braying. Donkey ears pop out of his head. A donkey tail sprouts from his backside. The boy is becoming an animal.

There is more going on in this story than we realize as children. The crux of the tale is that as Pinocchio ignores his conscience, he becomes more like a beast. He becomes something less than human. A conscience is not only indispensable to living a life pleasing to God and enjoying peace with God; it is essential for living as the human beings God made us to be.



SOME REFLECTIONS FROM MY TIME IN UGANDA

Uganda Christians love to sing praise to God.



Our day started with a short service in which the joy of the delegates spilled over into wonderful sung praise of God. They love Jesus and they love to sing of his love. It was exciting to sing with brothers and sisters in Christ from another culture and think, the new creation will be like this.

Uganda Christians love to be in church

I preached in one of six services that where held on Sunday in a local church. There were over 400 people crammed into the 7am service with some more outside under an awning. They loved being together and hearing God's word, many had got up while it was still dark to be there. I was humbled by their commitment to meeting with God's people. Half way through my sermon the choir stood up and sung an impromptu chorus! I took this as an encouragement. My children wondered if they wanted me to stop!



Serving as part of a team is great fun



Our mission partners Chris and Ros Howles are doing an amazing job in the seminary where they teach. It was such a joy to be able to go out there and strengthen their hands. They are training the next generation of Ugandan church leaders with grace and humility. The men and women who lead the conference were from different parts of the UK but God united us around the gospel of Jesus, helped us to serve the Ugandan pastors and made doing it lots of fun. I'm so thankful that following Jesus is a team sport and that he gives us each other to serve with.

Ugandan Lunches are huge.



Hospitality in Ugandan culture is very important. One delegate said to me that if I came to his house and wasn't given anything to eat, it would be like I hadn't come. Every day we ate with our brothers and sisters, enjoying their friendship and struggling to finish our plates. Being deeply relational they loved the fact that we had come to Uganda and welcomed us whole heartedly. There is something very personal about sharing food together.

Suffering is an expected part of the Christian life



Each day we spent the afternoon sharing testimony of the Lord's work in our lives and praying with each other. Although our cultures are very different, one of the things that stuck me was how all Christians, no matter where they live struggle with sin, the world and the devil. Our brothers and sisters out there were all very familiar with debt, death and disease. They are usually caring for children that they have adopted as a result of parental death. They are poorly treated, poorly paid and full of love for Jesus. I realised again just how much I take for granted, clean water, good healthcare, schooling, security, clean air....





In numbers and in depth, but the challenges are also growing. The rise of the Prosperity gospel is conning many poor Ugandans out of money. Islam is also growing. The need for men and women to be trained to rightly handle the word of God is pressing. The Seminary where Chris and Ros work is doing that and it was a great privilege to be able to partner with them. I am so grateful to everyone at HPC who so generously gave and prayed to make it possible.

HAILSHAM BELLS AND RINGERS

As many of you will realise, we were unable to have access to the tower to ring the bells once the work on the west end of the church had started. This was in order to comply with Health and Safety requirements and those of the church's insurance company. This meant that our last ringing before the work started was on Easter Day.

In order for our ringers to keep in practice, which is absolutely vital, we have been accommodated by a number of the churches in the area who have kindly allowed us to ring on their bells on a Monday evening. This has been of great benefit in keeping our band



together and we are most grateful to those churches and to Elizabeth Munday for making the arrangements with them. We were also able to assist two or three less experienced ringers from these churches to progress their ringing.

During the time of silence from our tower, many people were missing the bells and asked when they would be heard again. We were therefore very pleased that Ken Thomas was able to arrange with the builders to give us access to ring over the Christmas period and many people have made appreciative comments on hearing the bells.



Because of the practice he put in over the time between Easter and Christmas, Samuel Canning was able to ring his first quarter peal (about 40 minutes ringing non-stop) before the Carol Service and another on New Year's Eve. Samuel is to be congratulated on the high standard of his performance on both occasions, which requires not only the physical effort but a high degree of mental concentration also.

The control of the tower has now been handed back to the builders while the west end work is completed so there will be another break from hearing our bells but hopefully not for too long this time.

If there is anyone who thinks they would like to consider learning to ring the bells, we would be very pleased to talk to you.



A FLAVOUR OF OUR CAROL SERVICES IN HAILSHAM CARE HOMES

Through December a good number of us from church were made very welcome at seven local care homes (and other similar residential settings) as we led carol services for the residents of each home as well as staff members and guests such as family members who were able to attend.

We visited Bentley Grange, Luke Lade Court, Bowes House, Marshview, Quinnell House, Caroline House and Woodside Hall. A selection of readings, carols, prayers, a musical item or a poem and a talk given this time by Linda Garvican or Margery Luffingham made for a varied service that brought the good news of Christmas and the challenge to

respond in faith to everyone present. We were encouraged that the numbers of people who attended the services across all seven homes not including team members from church totalled around 125. From mince pies to hot chocolate with marshmallows, we were treated to various seasonal delights as we enjoyed chatting with residents and their relatives after each service!

100 YEARS AGO

From the Hailsham Parish Magazines of February/March 1920

February 1920

Dear Friends

As a Church we intend to make our effort this Lent round the Magham Down Mission Room. There has been a revival of village social life, owning a great deal to the energy and unselfish work of a few inhabitants. Why not deepen it by a revival of Spiritual life, then all life will be quickened. I am delighted at the response to the Bellringing appeal. May they take it up as a work for God and go on advancing in the art. It is a great thing to be a Bell Ringer in the House of God; it is better to be a good Bell Ringer.

So Sackville Roads are shelved for a time! No material to be had! "Give them some Beach" I remember when a great statesman said to the Farmers "Make jam". Well, let us keep the pot boiling and perhaps we shall get some jam in time.. it is an open sore! Material was not always so scarce, now, for a time, anyhow, it is perfectly true. Can't we get the owners to put some beach or clinkers down: 30/- a truck?

So the Hut is to be opened, Feb. 5th. A Church Parade is to be held on Feb. 8th, at 3pm, for all Comrades and others, and the offertories all day will be given to the Hut Fund.

William Weller, who has been Captain of the Ringers since 1890 and has rung the bells since 1885, retires from old age. He has kept the team together splendidly for all that time. The team are a model of what Bell Ringers should be as regards conduct and behaviour. The thanks of the whole Parish are due to William Weller, who lays down his bell or hangs it up pure and unsullied, which he has so long rung to the praise and glory of God. We thank him.

The Ringers' appeal has been answered by five members of our congregation, who are now learning to ring: Sergt-Major Crowhurst, Messrs. Matthews, Mercer, Ringer and Clarke. Mr Simpson is getting up a team of Handbell Ringers amongst the lads of the Church. The Ringers have gone on for years doing the good service of calling the people to Prayer and Praise in the service of God's House. They have been a united, steady and God-fearing lot, and some from age and infirmity have had to give it up. On Tuesday February 29th, 1901, the first year of King Edward VII, there was rung in two hours and forty-eight minutes a Peal of Grandsire Triples, 5,040 changes; three of those now ringing took part in it – Charles Prangnell, John Matthews, Harry Vine. Tom Burgess and Reuben Bignell have retired. Let us hope they will go on to higher ringing still in the future. Campanology is no mean art.

The Clock is to be put into the hands of Mr Sharp of Elmsdown Place and no longer under the care of the Ringers, who do not consider it to be their proper work.

March 1920

Now that the Institute is running, the Obelisk has money enough and the Hut is up and used, I have no hesitation in asking for funds to set to work at the Memorial Window in Church. Please send your donations to Mr Simpson, Churchwarden and Banker.

Easter Day, April 4th, will offer you plenty of occasions for Holy Communion, 7 am, 8 am, 12 noon. Do not excommunicate yourselves.

There is, unfortunately, a larger deficit on the Parish Magazine than last year, amounting to over £20. Expenses have gone up. To get rid of this we must ask our friends to organise a Jumble Sale in the Spring; and to carry on we must ask everyone who can to pay twopence, and those who cannot, a penny as before, so as not to let the circulation suffer, for it is such a useful means of communication for the whole parish.

The Comrades' Hut was opened by the Lord Lieutenant, our Member, and others, February 5th. It was crammed and all went off well. The Sale of Work later was a great event and took nearly £150. Mrs. Douglas Hogg made her first speech here and spoke very well.

Sackville Roads and Paths reached the Parochial Council and thence back to the District Council. Why not ask the County Council (Roads and Bridges) to inspect it? At any rate, Hope is springing up in Sackville.

An important meeting of friends of the Scout movement was held February 24th in the Parish Room, called by Mrs Warner Abbatt, who is an excellent Secretary and will make the thing go. Mrs Abbatt ran the Girl Guides at Slinfold during the War. It is to be on a large scale taking in the District. Two ladies, Mrs Abbatt and Mrs Douglas Hogg have come before us lately, new to Hailsham, and both bid fair to take an active and useful part in Parish activities.

A meeting of the League of Nations was held at the Church Room on 20th March. About 60 were present, chiefly men. The Rev. Foster Jeffreys gave an intellectual address which required careful following. The purpose, organisation and machinery of the League seems admirable, but it just wants the motive power. This we must look to Christianity to supply so this League may be the advance guard of a great outpouring of the Spirit. Just as Greece and Rome were used for the spread of Christianity, so this may be. Anyhow, Christians should join..


