

REMEMBRANCE

I wandered into St. Andrew's Church, Alfriston recently and saw twenty five clear plastic outlines of men sitting in the pews. It was part of a nationwide art display called 'There but not There' as means of commemorating and remembering all those who were killed in the First World War. Each one had a small plastic plaque with the name of date of death of each of the men killed.





It was easy to imagine those twenty five men sitting in those seats before the war, and the hole in the life of their families and their community that their deaths must have left.

The names of the eighty eight men from our town and the surrounding area will again be commemorated on Remembrance Sunday this year, one hundred years after the guns finally fell silent.

Remembrance Sunday isn't a day for jingoism or for glorying in war. The painful experience of the 'War on Terror' and the protracted campaign of the British armed forces in Afghanistan has made many people cautious about military intervention. We understand the need for our armed forces but if we are honest we prefer not to dwell on it too much.

Thomas Jordan summed up what can be our attitude in these short verses.

God and Soldier we adore In time of trouble, not before Troubles past, and all things righted, God forgotten, soldier slighted.



Fewer and fewer people have served in our armed forces, and as the number of people in our country in uniform shrinks, not many of us have any military connections. And yet every year we say the following.

Let us remember with gratitude those who, in the cause of peace and in the service of their fellow men, died for their country in time of war.

They shall grow not old and we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we will remember them.

It seems to me a good and right thing to do, with a mixture of thankfulness and sorrow to remember them. It seems to me to be a Christian thing to do. It was Jesus who commanded his followers to remember, not the sacrifice of those who died in the time of war but his own sacrifice of himself. We do that every time we eat the bread and drink the wine at the Lord's Supper. Christian people see in the sacrifice of our service personnel an even braver and more brilliant act of self-giving; that of the Lord Jesus on a cross outside Jerusalem. Christians know more than anyone else what it is to benefit from someone else going to their death that we might have life. On Commonwealth War Graves around the globe are written words from the Gospel of John,

"Greater love has no one than this; that he lay down his life for his friends."

That is why Remembrance Sunday is such a moving day, because there is something about the selflessness and sacrifice of the men and women in uniform which points to the ministry of Jesus.

The freedoms that I enjoy, the security which I can take for granted were bought at a cost and someone else paid that cost. So on the 11th November I will join with many in our town and across our nation, to listen to 'The Last Post', to stand and to silently thank God for those who

gave themselves that I might

know peace.

We will remember them.




could change everything... what WAS in the Captain's briefcase?

I felt panic rising in my chest. Where is my son? We are a happy family with many aunts, uncles and cousins and our trip to the Passover celebrations at Jerusalem is very special this year as Jesus is 12 years old and has begun his special year of learning about our faith. This means lots of extra study but Jesus should do well as he always has his head in the Scriptures. I feel more



afraid for Jesus than for my other children, that is, mine and Joseph's. The extraordinary circumstances surrounding Jesus' birth at Bethlehem were strange enough, so far away from home on the whim of Caesar Augustus but since then I've managed to ignore the hurtful gossip, trusting God to keep us all in His care. However, all that dreaming about the past doesn't change the fact that Jesus is missing from our big group of family and friends. No-one seems to have seen him since we left Jerusalem to return home, so Joseph and I are going to have to leave the other children with the family and go back to find him. Heaven alone knows what Jesus is up to as it is now three days since anyone seems to have seen him so we are really anxious.



Back to Jerusalem then and guess what, Jesus was still in the Temple Courts with the Rabbis and all the other teachers discussing Scripture like someone of twice his age and learning. We were very cross with him. 'Son, how could you do this to us ?'. said Joseph. 'We were so worried about you' I added. Jesus just seemed puzzled. 'But why were you worried and why were you looking for me' he asked. 'Didn't you know that I had to be here in my Father's House?' We were

reduced to silence at this reply so I just said 'Well come along with us now, we must get back to your brothers and sisters, we have left them long enough.' Jesus came with us obediently then.

I am so thankful to have found my son safe and sound and said a prayer of gratitude to God. I was quiet myself on the walk back, trying to piece together all these events.

What did I let myself in for when I said 'yes' to the angel all those years ago and What on earth is next I wonder.

100 YEARS AGO

From the Hailsham Parish Magazines of October/November 1918 October

The news from France is good. In scriptural language, "There is a sound of abundance of rain" Now what shall we do at home: shall we like Ahab throw off restraint, have a good time, each try to make the best for himself, or shall we with Elijah go to Carmel and pray with the God who gives us the lifting up? The latter is the most patriotic and safest, the former the most selfish and unpatriotic. The end has not come yet, but the relief of Palestine appears to be scriptural and therefore full of immense possibilities all round.

The Housing Meeting held in the Church Room, September 9th by the R.D.C., was well attended by representative men and was animated. There seems to be plenty of demand for cottages in large villages, but there are also a lot of cottages unfit for sound, healthy habitation, which should be pulled down, or condemned: I could show several between the Council School and the East end of this parish. In October we shall arrange for lectures on Horticulture and production of fruit, vegetables, etc, from the County Council. Food is and will be the pressing want. Every one must do all he can and learn what he can, to help himself and others. It is wonderful what we have done in the Country, let us abound more and more.

Hailsham has sent just over half a ton of blackberries to Messrs. Newberry Bros. Battle, to be made into jam for our Soldiers and Sailors the boys and girls from the Council School have done excellent service and brought in 730lbs of the above amount. We hope to get another 560lbs (1/4 ton) before the season is ended.

The War Savings' Association reports progress all round. Chiddingly, Hellingly, Herstmonceux are in full swing, Polegate, Laughton, Ripe, Wartling are hoping. This is the financial way of winning the War. Let there be no mistake! Patriotism!

November 1918

My text during the War has been 1 Peter V, 6-10. We are now fully in the 10th verse, where the proper reading is "He *Himself* will perfect, strengthen stablish you" the words "in due time", v.6, mean "in the opportune moment." That moment has come. He is doing it. Let us devoutly recognise His Mighty Hand – it is a supreme moment. The Christ is raised above all Empire, delegated Authority, power and Lordship, he is showing it awefully. Let us Rejoice with trembling. We want all the strength and wisdom we can get for our Councillors, especially the Supreme War Council of the Allies and for our Cabinet and Parliament.

The collapse is so extraordinary and sudden that it reminds one of another would-be World Power, charging after the contemptible little army as it receded into the sand – "Stand still and see the Salvation of God", what a crash! In the morning what was there left of Pharaoh? He was so proud of his chariots too; his shining armour and sharp sword! Christianity is very glorious and very terrible.

I repeat the exhortation in the last Magazine that all our Church people should join the F.O.F. (Freewill Offering Fund), that is, become regular subscribers to the Church Funds, of which Mr Towler is the Hon. Sec. These answer to the "necessary uses" alluded to by St. Paul in Titus 3, 14. And neglecting such, he says stamps us "unfruitful"

On November 12th the Infant School will be closed for the afternoon to enable the Teachers to go to a Conference at All Souls Parish Room, Eastbourne, 2.45pm, to meet the new Inspector of Religious Knowledge and to confer on new methods of Religious Instruction. I can get tickets for any Day School teachers desirous of attending. The Hon. Mrs Gwynne wants to start a Women's' Committee of the Great War in Hailsham and proposes to hold a meeting in the Church Room on Nov. 21st, at 3pm.

Mr Maryan announces that close on £80 has been sent to the Princess Alice Hospital so far collected by his Committee How much we owe to this Hospital. How nice and appropriate a memorial for all the brave fellows have sacrificed, if we could raise money after the war to establish a "Hailsham Memorial Ward" in that Hospital. Every sick person going there would feel he was going to his own and would remember always their brave deeds. Surely nothing would produce such willing giving? (only a suggestion) F Clyde Harvey




